- * 2015 was a landmark year for multilateralism and international policy shaping:
 - * Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (March 2015)
 - * Transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development with its 17 SDGs was adopted at the UN Sustainable Development Summit in New York in September 2015.
 - Paris Agreement on Climate Change (December 2015)









The Sendai Framework

<u>Outcome</u>: The substantial reduction of disaster risk and losses in lives, livelihoods and health and in the economic, physical, social, cultural and environmental assets of persons, businesses, communities and countries.

<u>Goal:</u> Prevent new and reduce existing disaster risk through the implementation of integrated and inclusive economic, structural, legal, social, health, cultural, educational, environmental, technological, political and institutional measures that prevent and reduce hazard exposure and vulnerability to disaster, increase preparedness for response and recovery, and thus strengthen resilience.

7 Global targets agreed to measure progress.

Sendai framework indicators

There are 38 indicators in the Sendai Framework. Some examples:

A1: Number of deaths and missing persons attributed to disasters, per 100,000 population.

B2: Number of injured or ill people attributed to disasters, per 100,000 population.

C4: Direct economic loss in the housing sector attributed to disasters.

D1: Damage to critical infrastructure attributed to disasters.

F1: Total official international support, (official development assistance (ODA) plus other official flows), for national disaster risk reduction actions.

There are **25 targets related** to disaster risk reduction in **10** of the 17 sustainable development goals

Goal 1. End poverty in all its forms everywhere

3.d Strengthen the capacity of all countries, in particular developing countries, for early warning, risk reduction and management of national and global health risks




Goal 6. Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all

Sendai Framework and 2030 Agenda: Links with SDGs








