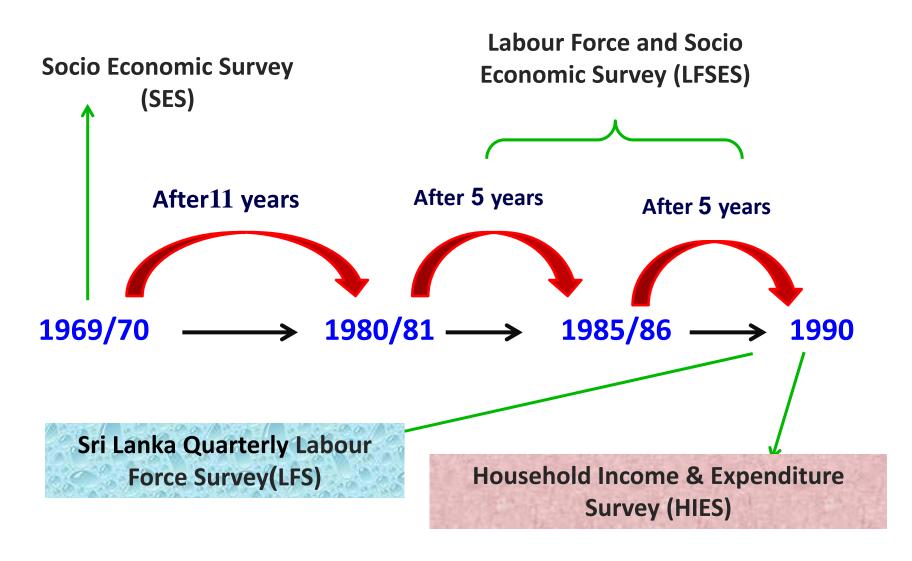

Sri Lanka Labour Force Survey

- Labour force survey was started in 1990 and continued until today.
- Beginning in January 2006, some significant improvements were made to the labour force survey schedule focusing on
 - literacy
 - household economic activities
 - informal sector employment
 - underemployment

This revised version had been continued until 2012.

• In 2013, new improvements were done for the structure of this survey schedule. Some conceptual and classification changes were also incorporated.

For example:

- ✓ aged 15 and above population is considered as working age population.
- ✓ Several questions regarding the informal employment were also added.

Coverage and methodology

- The survey covers whole country and conducts in all four quarters based on an annual sample of 25,000 housing units.
- Two stage stratified sampling procedure is adopted to select the sample of 25,000 housing units.
- The list of House Holds of Census of Population and Housing in 2011 was used as the sampling frame for this survey.

Coverage and methodologycontd.

- Although the data were collected in each months the results were produced at quarterly and annually basis.
- Objectives are to provide information on
 - —economically active, economically inactive & labour force of the country.
 - —employment, unemployment, underemployment, informal sector employment & literacy.

Quality of data is assured

- Trained permanent staff is engaged in survey activities.
- Quality improvement methods are used at data coding, entry and editing
 - Double data entry for data validation
 - Manual editing and computer editing (range, consistency and structural)
 - Unique guidelines for data cleaning
 - Use Standard code lists (SLSIC-Rev.4, SSCO-08)
- Frequent supervision
 - Head office
 - District office
- Current survey concepts and methods are very similar to those introduced at the beginning in 1990. Changes were done to enhance the quality of data and international comparability.

Labour force key indicators

- Labour force participation rate
- Unemployment rate
- Employment rate
- Literacy rate

Informal Sector Employment

- Informal sector units are identified by using the Formal Sector definition. The establishment belongs to the formal sector, if it satisfies at least one of the following conditions.
 - (i) Registration under EPF Act/ Paying income tax
 - (ii) Accounts keeping practices of the organization
 - (iii) Total number of regular employees of the organization is greater than or equal to 10.

Therefore if all of the above conditions are not satisfied it will be considered as an informal sector employment.

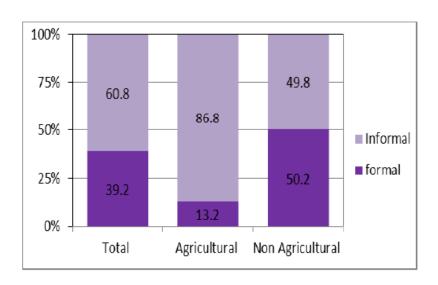

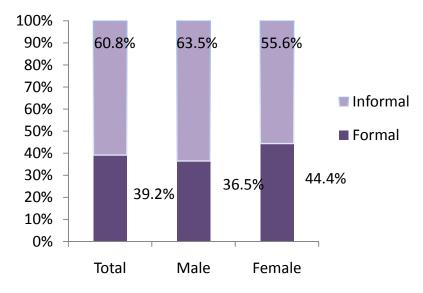
Contribution of Informal / Formal sector employment by economic sector - 2013

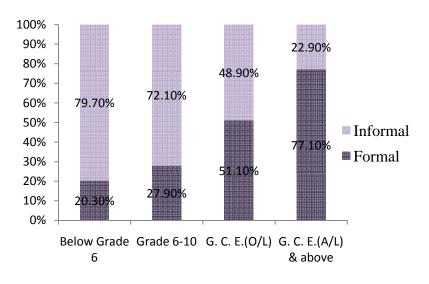

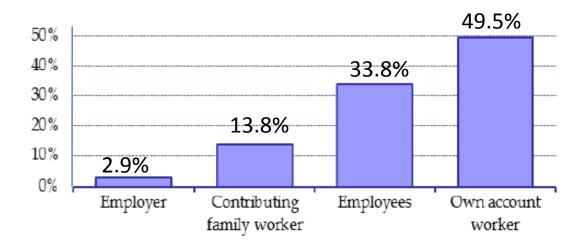

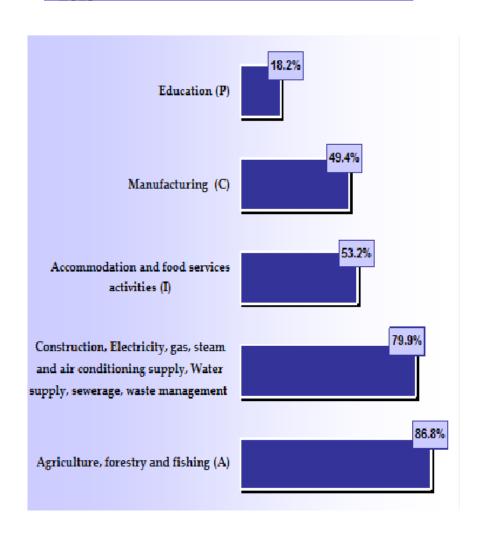


Contribution of Informal sector employment for each employment status -2013
